The IWD campaign website calls on everyone to #BreakTheBias, and that's what we should all strive to do and level the playing field.

The United Nations (UN) theme for the day this year is Gender Equality Today for a Sustainable Tomorrow, focusing on climate change and how women and girls are more severely affected by it than men and at the same time are powerful change-makers leading sustainability initiatives around the world.

ICN's <u>Position Statement on Climate</u> change recognises it is the single largest threat to global development, and has the potential to undermine many of the health gains we have achieved in the past 50 years.

The changing climate has created many humanitarian disasters and will no doubt cause many more. In such situations, women suffer more than men, just as they do in all humanitarian crises, including wars, such as the one currently being waged in Ukraine.
