Nurses and midwives provide essential health services, addressing health determinants with focus on prevention and health promotion which are central to public health addressing today's major health challenges such as NCDs or the ageing populations. As the most respected and trusted influencers by the individuals and the community, they promote health literacy and healthy behaviors working with communities and families; they provide and manage personal care and treatment; they assist in clinical decision-making and encourage people to prevent diseases and keep themselves healthy.

Nurses and midwives play the invaluable role of providing first aid in emergencies, exposing their lives in outbreaks or humanitarian crisis to take care of the sick or protect those at risk. It will leverage on policy options, regulatory frameworks and collaboration between countries to address shortages of health workforce. It will create platforms for networking and for their voices to be heard. Eventually it will result in strengthening nurses' and midwifes' positioning within the health systems, which in turn will strengthen the health system itself. This makes the essence of Health 2030.

I also very warmly welcome the initiative of Dr Tedros announcing 2020 as the Year of the Nurse and Midwife and I am looking forward to working closely with you in advocating for strengthening the nursing and midwifery throughout the European Region of WHO. I am also committed to take an active role in the Global Health Workforce Network engaging in intersectoral and multi stakeholder mechanisms to implement the Global Strategy on Human Resources for Health and European framework towards a sustainable health workforce.
