WHAT IS GNLI?

Now in its 10th successful year, GNLI offers a unique development opportunity to top nurse leaders across the world, focusing on policy influence and strategic leadership. Around 300 scholars from 80 different countries attended GNLI between 2009 and 2018.

The annual programme, conducted in English, is six months long and comprises:

- an orientation module completed on line;
- a week-long residential workshop in Geneva, Switzerland;

- an implementation module completed on line.

GNLI uses a blended action learning approach in a collaborative and stimulating environment.

Scholars develop their leadership competencies through interaction with each other, international faculty, and site visits to global health organisations.

Scholars are eligible for ICN International Continuing Nursing Education Credits.

Everyone who completes the programme is invited to join the worldwide network of GNLI alumni.

WHAT HAS GNLI ACHIEVED?

GNLI is evaluated every year by scholars, faculty and donors. The results are outstandingly positive. GNLI alumni have:

- a better understanding of how to influence policy.
- an improved ability to identify, understand and work with stakeholders within and beyond the nursing profession.
- a greater awareness of the competencies needed to negotiate with policy stakeholders.
- enhanced ability to review and frame the evidence base within local, national and international political, health and social care contexts.

- an enhanced ability to create clear policy messages that appeal to politicians, policy-makers and the public.

GNLI alumni use these skills in many important activities to improve health outcomes. These include leading and contributing to national action plans for nursing and midwifery, and other major policies; reforming nursing education; leading clinical developments; conducting research to underpin policy; and ensuring nursing voices are heard alongside other stakeholders. They are also in the forefront of the Nursing Now campaign.
